



Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Make connections between seemingly distant international events and one's more immediate world, and demonstrate an understanding of how the international sphere both shapes and is shaped by the social, political, and economic activities of individuals who act collectively.
- Work with others in collaborative projects and/or participate in small-group discussions whether live or on-line and demonstrate the ability to engage a diversity of viewpoints about international politics in a civil and constructive fashion.

Weekly Reading Summaries (WRS): 65 points

 Most weeks you will summarize the main points from the weekly readings by FRIDAY NIGHT. Completing the summaries will provide a solid foundation for understanding the content and better prepare you to complete the critical thinking responses.

Critical Thinking Responses (CTR): 168 points

Most weeks you will complete an analysis of the week's content through three
critical thinking questions by SUNDAY NIGHT. Completing CTR's will not only
provide a deeper understanding of the content but also develop your analytical
skills. There is one exception, which is the shortened Week 16.

Content Quizzes: 160 points

• You will take five quizzes in specific weeks which will deal with five specific sections of course content. The quizzes will be in multiple choice and short answer format and will be completed by each respective SUNDAY NIGHT.

Map Quizzes: 65 points

• You will take five map quizzes. The first four will be worth 10 points each and you will have multiple attempts to take them. The final map quiz will be worth 25 points and you will only have one attempt.

Event Quizzes: 65 points

• You will take five event quizzes. The first four will be worth 10 points each and you will have multiple attempts to take them. The final events quiz will be worth 25 points and you will only have one attempt.

Main Essay-Two Drafts: 220 points (IR Theory Essay first draft/Video Summary= 160/Final Draft 50)

• There is one main essay in this course and one possibility to turn in a final draft. The main purpose of the essay is to require you to demonstrate research skills, develop a thesis, construct a rational argument on a specific topic and present a video summary of your work. The main essay is on IR Theory and will be 3 pages. For the IR Theory essay, you will turn in a first draft and then a final draft. The first draft is worth 160 points and the final draft is worth 50 points. Details on the essays will be in Canvas at their respective assignment portals.

Feedback on First Draft of IR Theory: 20 points

• You will respond, in your own words, to the feedback I gave you for the first draft of your IR Theory Essay. I want you to process how I have corrected your essay and, thus, how to become a better writer.

Final-PowerPoint (or similar) Presentation on a UN Peacekeeping Operation: 200 points.

- 10-12 minutes. Deadline to choose a date/ and topic= 11-3. I will determine each person's grade in the following way. 120 points=Content, 50 points= Organization, 30 points= Oral Delivery. You will record yourself giving an oral presentation that summarizes the slides you have created.
- *The United Nations has a number of peacekeeping operations around the world. You can find the current locations at https://peacekeeping.un.org/en/where-we-operate. You will choose ONE to focus on for the presentation. Your PowerPoint will have four sections: describe the background to the conflict, the conditions on the ground today, why it is difficult to solve and the prospects for the resolution of the crisis.*

Signature Assignment: Upload=10 Points Reflection= 17 points (Total=27)

• You will upload your corrected IR Theory Essay

• You will then write a reflection on the process of completing the assignment, how the material connects to other academic disciplines and your key takeaways.

Late Work

- Each assignment has a due date. That date is designed to keep you on an appropriate pace. However, given life's complexities, I have a late policy for some assignments.
- (Late Policy for the Interest Group Essay drafts, Quizzes, or the Signature Assignment= 1. If completed or turned in three days AFTER the due date, penalty= -10%. 2. If turned in at a later date up to 8-12-24, penalty = -25%.

If AI is suspected as used, the student will have to resubmit the assignment or receive a zero as a grade.

- 1) Once you have submitted an assignment in Canvas, open up a second window in our Canvas course that shows ALL the Modules
- 2) Find the "Copyleaks Teacher Scanner Tool" below Week 17
- 3) Click on "Teacher Scanner Tool" and open
- 4) For simply copying and pasting text into the program, click on the "three dots" to the left of "Scan Documents" then click "Scan Text"
- 5) 'Copy and Paste' the text into the program, then click "Scan" at BOTTOM and wait for results
- 6) When scan is completed, there will be a Plagiarism (Matching) Score and an Al Score
- 7) Remember, Matching Score must be 30% or less and Al Score 50% or less
- *Again, all this is only necessary to deal with if you fear your material will cross the acceptable line*
