Course Description

The study and comparison of political power, institutions, culture, and patterns of interaction within and across countries. Emphasis is placed on the comparative method; major themes such as the state, nation, nationalism, democracy, and political economy; and how history, identity, and resources shape political interaction and outcomes in a wide range of country cases. Students learn about similarities and differences across countries, and come into contact with cultural and political contexts other than their own.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Articulate the fundamental concepts of comparative politics and apply the primary methods and approaches used by comparativists to analyze political systems.
- Demonstrate the use of the Most Similar System Design (MSSD) and the Most Different System Design (MDSD) techniques by evaluating empirical data in comparative case studies.
- Analyze the causal factors contributing to uneven development, democratic decline, and the influence of identity on political outcomes across different countries.
- Evaluate the behavioral variations among political figures, groups, or countries by identifying and explaining the underlying socio-political that contributed to these differences.
- Locate, assess, and synthesize information from diverse, credible sources to support arguments in comparative politics, adhering to ethical research standards.

Coursework & Assignment Descriptions

Weekly Reading Summary (WRS): Each week, after completing the assigned readings, you write and submit a WRS. The WRS is a brief submission (2-3 paragraphs long), and using your own words you will paraphrase the main points of the reading. Do not try to critique or respond to ideas in the text; the goal of the WRS is to summarize and demonstrate an

understanding of the material. WRS's are due every Thursday. While late summaries will be accepted, they will be subject to penalties for every day that they are late.

Critical Thinking Response (CTR): Each week, after reading and watching the assigned material, you will complete a CTR. Each response must be at least two full paragraphs long, engage critically with the questions or theme under study by offering a clear thought and argument, and support the argument with examples or evidence. Additionally, you will need to respond to at least two posts from classmates. Each response to a classmate must be constructive and coherent (no less than 100 words) and add knowledge to the overall discussion. Critical thinking is not only about what you think, but what you think and argue. Thus, the "I agree" type of response will not earn full points.

Quizzes: Throughout the semester you will complete 3 quizzes that closely track the readings and videos shown in the modules (see Modules for quiz schedule details). Each quiz will have 20 multiple-choice questions for a total of 60 points. All 3 quizzes will make up 18% of your final grade. Quizzes are not accumulative. Quizzes will be open for a week so you can complete them at any time and any place within that time-frame. Note, you have 20 minutes to complete the quiz once you start it, so make sure you are prepared before you start.

Research Question, Table, and Thesis Statement 1: This assignment will lead to comparative paper outline 1. Further details are found in the assignment directions.

Research Question, Table, and Thesis Statement 2: This assignment will lead to comparative paper outline 2. Further details are found in the assignment directions.

Comparative Paper Outline 1: The outline will lead to comparative paper 1: Further details are found in the assignment directions.

Comparative Paper Outline 2: The outline will lead to comparative paper 2. Further details are found in the assignment directions.

Comparative Papers x 2: Throughout the course you will write two Comparative Papers. Each paper needs to be about 5-7 pages long (double space). Your first paper will compare a comparative theme across two cases using the Most Similar System Design (MSSD) technique and your second paper will compare a comparative theme across to cases using the Most Different System Design (MDSD) technique. Each paper is worth 200

points and both papers make up 40% of your final grade. More information will be given to you in class throughout the semester.
