Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Describe key developmental psychology concepts, multiple theoretical perspectives, research methods, and recent advances within the field of developmental psychology.
- Identify the basic elements of developmental research methodology as a way of acquiring knowledge about human development.
- Characterize the processes by which we grow and develop in each of the three main dimensions: physical, cognitive, socioemotional.
- Recognize the role of nature (genetics, biological maturation) and nurture (environmental, social, cultural) at each stage of our growth and development within all relevant contexts (e.g. family, school, culture).
- Recognize the patterns of change and stability throughout the lifespan, utilizing credible sources containing empirical research findings and case study data.
- Make connections between material provided in the class and text and the "real world" with practical applications, and apply class information to self, family, social groups, and humankind in a multicultural context.
- Identify the role of culture and diversity in growth and development and of the range of differences and similarities between peoples.

- Evaluate competing theories, hypotheses and concepts by taking multiple perspectives, using empirical evidence, and employing critical thinking skills.
- Demonstrate effective communication skills such as reading, writing, speaking and listening.

SmartBook Content Assignments

Points: 20 points each (340 Total)

Due Date: Please see the "Assignment Schedule" section of this syllabus listed above for specific dates.

Description: Each SmartBook assignment contains the reading from that chapter, followed by content questions assessing your familiarity with the reading.

Grading Criteria: Content questions will be provided for each chapter. Students will be provided with a minimum number of questions depending on the number of concepts (2 questions per concept). Incorrect responses will provide students with an opportunity to review the information further before being reassessed with a new question. Full points are given for each completion.

Quest: Journey Through the Lifespan

Points: 15 points each (210 Total)

Due Date: Please see the "Assignment Schedule" section of this syllabus listed above for specific dates.

Description: Immersive experiences (called quests) that apply knowledge of the key learning theories of developmental psychology to real-life situations and feature characters of diverse ages and backgrounds.

Grading Criteria: Unlimited attempts to work through each Quest. Full points are given for each completion.

Participation and Attendance

Points: 5 points per class (150 Total)

Description: Attendance will be taken in each class, which will count toward points

earned for that day.

Grading Criteria: Showing up prepared and willing to participate will earn full points.

COURSE GRADING POLICIES

Grading Turnaround/Response Time: I typically begin grading assignments after the assignment closes on Canvas. Typically, you will receive feedback/grade 1-4 days after the closing date, depending on the depth/breadth of the assignment.

Late Submissions: You may submit assignments late, with the exception of the Signature Assignment and the Reflection Assignment, which are due at the end of the semester. However, there will be a 5% deduction applied to the final score received per day late on all other assignments.

WHAT SHOULD I DO TO BE SUCCESSFUL IN THIS COURSE?

• Expect to put time into the course. In higher education, for a 3-credit-hour class, students should expect to put in 2-3 hours per week reading, studying, or doing assignments. Consider scheduling yourself enough time for this.

- Don't let yourself get behind. It's easy to get overwhelmed when you have so many things (besides school that you are responsible for.) Managing your time, sticking to schedules the best you can, will cut down on stress, allowing you to think and work more efficiently.
- Login to Canvas frequently to keep track of all the assignment due dates it seems like there are a lot of them, but totally doable.
- Use the Canvas Calendar to keep track.
- Check your Bruin email regularly. Expect to see emails from me throughout the semester.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I NEED HELP?

- Seek help early as soon as you realize things are not going as planned. The longer you wait, the less likely it is that you can turn things around.
- If it's simply a matter of a time crunch, remember there are some (not all) assignments that provide small extensions. These assignments allow you to submit work after the deadline with a small deduction in points per day. See each assignment category for more details.
